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Bridging faith and diplomacy: a conversation with the Apostolic Nuncio to New Zealand

Part 1 of an interview with Archbishop Gábor Pintér, Apostolic Nuncio to New Zealand, the Cook Islands, Fiji, Kiribati, the Marshall Islands, Micronesia, Nauru, Palau, Samoa and Vanuatu, and Apostolic Delegate to the Pacific Ocean.

Most Catholics know about the spiritual history of the Holy See. Not as many know about its diplomatic history.

His Excellency Archbishop Gábor Pintér, Apostolic Nuncio to New Zealand and several other Pacific nations including Fiji, Samoa and Vanuatu, provides a quick lesson. The Holy See, he explains, has the world's oldest continuously-serving diplomatic corps, dating back more than 1,500 years!

An apostolic nuncio, he says, is the Pope's permanent diplomatic representative to a sovereign state or international organisation. He attends diplomatic functions with representatives from many countries, meets with government officials and civil society members (such as social organisations), and takes part in community events.

But he also attends Masses and other Catholic events throughout New Zealand and the Pacific, seated by the altar with fellow clergy. Ordained as a priest in 1988 – prior to his diplomatic career – he can deliver homilies, provide blessings and distribute the Precious Body and Blood of the Eucharist.

He's also the Titular Archbishop of Velebusdus, a community in present-day western Bulgaria, located in Europe between Greece, Turkey, Romania and the Black Sea.

These responsibilities mean he bridges faith and diplomacy. He says if he could describe his role in one word, it would be "coordination".

Archbishop Gábor explains an example of bridging faith and diplomacy is his work to help ensure the free functioning of the Catholic Church without government interference, so that Catholics can do things like attend Mass without being persecuted. While we have freedom to practise our Catholic faith in New Zealand, this hasn't always been the case in nations where he's served as a diplomat.

One example was his time as Apostolic Nuncio to Belarus. The Eastern European nation was formerly part of the Soviet Union. Today it is a close ally of Russia and has supported the ongoing war in Ukraine.

Yet Archbishop Gábor describes a "miracle" of Catholic faith in Belarus surviving the Soviet Union, a decades-long period that lasted much of the 20th century when atheism was enforced and Christians were openly mocked and persecuted by the government.



Grandparents who remembered a time before the Soviet Union would pass the faith on in secret to their grandchildren, at risk of imprisonment in gulags if they were caught. These grandchildren then passed faith on to their own descendants. Today, 35 years after the dissolution of the Soviet Union in 1991, Archbishop Gábor says the Church in Belarus has grown from being at risk of extinction to an estimated two million Catholics – about 20 per cent of the total population.

Archbishop Gábor says a lesson we can learn from this is that everyday people can keep faith alive and nurture it. The nurturing of faith is also something he saw as Apostolic Nuncio to Honduras, his most recent role before being called to New Zealand in 2024, succeeding Archbishop Novatus Rugambwa.

Archbishop Gábor says it's a blessing to serve. He adds his roles have shown there's a real interest in the Church around the world.

Yet his career is also one he did not expect. He says that when he was in seminary in his home country of Hungary, he thought he'd only be a parish priest.

"God has a plan prepared for all of our lives."

Dear sisters and brothers in Christ

At the end of last month, Fr Paul Turner from Kansas City, Missouri spent time in our Archdiocese. Fr Paul was brought out at the invitation of the New Zealand bishops to spend time working with priests and groups of lay people on the celebration of the Mass. Fr Paul has spent much of his priestly life studying and helping others to understand the liturgy of the Church. He has written a number of books and has his own website: paulturner.org

When working with the priests, he went through the various parts of the Mass and explained what is written in the *General Instruction of the Roman Missal* and how it prescribes Mass should be celebrated. It was an excellent opportunity for us to reflect on the reality that the Mass is the liturgy of the Church, and that we have a responsibility to celebrate it in the way the Church asks of us.

Sometimes we endeavour to change the Mass or other liturgies to make them “more relevant” to people, or to reflect who we are as New Zealanders. There are some elements of this which we do and they have become part of the liturgical life of our country and have been approved by the Bishops Conference. However, when individuals or liturgy teams decide to do things differently, they run the risk of a level of subjectivism and personal preference that can cause tension. Some people may “like” what is done, others will not. So who decides?

When we celebrate the liturgy as the Church intends, we are able to do so with the dignity and structure that reflects the mind of the Church. We have the revised *Roman Missal* of 2010 which we follow. The reminder to us as priests is that when we change words or actions because we think they are better, we are running the risk of making the liturgy our own, rather than that of the Church. The same is true for those who organise our liturgies in our parishes and schools. There is some flexibility in places, but it is important we understand where those places are and where we are able to do so. Fr Paul's presence and work with us helped to clarify that.

One of the important parts of the workshop was on the place of the people of God in the liturgy and what are the parts and responsibilities of the people. The document *Sacrosanctum Concilium* from the Second Vatican Council outlined it as follows in paragraph 14: “Mother Church earnestly desires that all the faithful should be led to that fully conscious and active participation in liturgical celebrations which is demanded by the very nature of the liturgy. Such participation by the Christian people as ‘a chosen race, a royal priesthood, a holy nation, a redeemed people’ (1 Pet. 2:9; cf. 2:4-5), is their right and duty by reason of their baptism.”

What does that participation look like? It involves preparing to celebrate the liturgy before arriving at church. It is good to have read the Scriptures of the day before they are proclaimed. It means responding intentionally to the dialogue parts of the Mass. It means joining in the praise of God in the hymns and parts of the Mass that are sung. It means those who have ministries in the Mass carry them out with reverence and respect. It means spending time in silence and prayer during the quiet times of the Mass. It means that we are thinking about what we are doing and making that our prayer to God.

The liturgical life of the Church is one of the great gifts we have and, when done well, it helps connect us to God who loves us and wants to share his life with us. I encourage you to reflect on your own participation in the liturgy of the Church, and in how you are prepared and disposed to celebrate Mass and other liturgical activities.

As priests, we will endeavour to ensure we prepare well and that we lead the Mass in a prayerful way, which respects the sanctity of what we are doing and supports the importance of being a community of prayer and faith who gather.

Plans for New Cathedral of the Blessed Sacrament unveiled

Sixteen years after the first major earthquake, Christchurch Bishop Michael Gielen says there is a sense of joy and anticipation as plans for the new Cathedral of the Blessed Sacrament are unveiled.

Bishop Gielen wrote a pastoral letter that was read at Masses across the Diocese on July 26, marking the official launch of the campaign to build the new Cathedral.

In the letter, the 11th Bishop of Christchurch said the Catholic faithful

of today have the “responsibility” and “privilege” of building a Cathedral – something the first bishop carried more than 120 years ago.

“Our Catholic communities have changed in the decades since Bishop Grimes led our Diocese, but our desire for beauty, for welcome and for honouring God has not,” Bishop Gielen said.

During 2024, following periods of public consultation, Bishop Gielen announced that the Cathedral would

return to the Diocese’s traditional home on Barbadoes St and that it would retain the name Cathedral of the Blessed Sacrament.

In the two years since, significant work has been undertaken to develop the Cathedral’s design, in partnership with architect Warren and Mahoney.

“When I arrived in the Diocese four years ago, one of the questions I was most often asked was, ‘What is happening with the Cathedral?’ That question revealed something profound: the deep love our people have for their Mother Church,” Bishop Gielen said.

“Over these past four years, through listening, prayer and discernment, that shared vision has taken shape. Today, I am proud to say: here is our Mother Church. The vision has become a reality. Now, together, we can bring it to life.”

Bishop Gielen believes people will see in the design “a Cathedral that glorifies God, that serves as a beacon of faith in our city, that responds to the realities of the present day”.

Tony Brazier, who is leading the Cathedral campaign, said a focus on financial prudence and sustainable building, alongside the aspiration for beauty and dignity, saw an \$80 million budget emerge for the project.

That will cover the 800-seat Cathedral, the attached Perpetual Adoration chapel and the Te Rangimarie community centre, which can hold 300 people.

Mr Brazier said about \$45 million of the funds needed to build the Cathedral will come from insurance proceeds and the sale of diocesan assets. Of the \$35 million required through fundraising, more than \$19 million has already been found.

"Bishop Michael is emulating what Bishop Grimes did – inviting every Catholic family to make a sacrificial offering to build our new Cathedral," he said, noting that each person's "sacrifice" would be determined by their situation.

Bishop Gielen and many of the priests of the Diocese have committed to making a weekly financial contribution for the next five years. Those will add up to a significant gift.

And while he is encouraging all the Catholic faithful in Canterbury and the West Coast to find ways to offer financial support, enthusiasm and pledges have come from afar.

"I have been struck by the generosity of people who recognise what a sign of hope our Cathedral will be for Christchurch and our region," he said. "That generosity has been seen around New Zealand and from people of other faith traditions."

Surge in enquiries about the Catholic faith

In the first six months of 2026, the Catholic Enquiry Centre received as many enquiries as it did in all of 2025.

The CEC received 354 enquiries in the six months from January to June this year, with 70 per cent coming from individuals. Last year, 322 enquiries were received, with 58 per cent being from individuals.

Many of the enquiries this year are from individuals personally searching for faith. People are reaching out to ask questions, explore Christianity, return to the Church or enquire about becoming Catholic, the CEC stated in a Facebook post.

Among the messages the CEC received through social media this week are, "I am wanting to return to the faith after 32-year absence"; "What version of the Bible do Catholics read from?"; "Is Catholicism a religion after Christ or during Christ?"; "I am a Protestant who is enquiring about the Catholic faith."; "Do you keep the Sabbath holy?"

The CEC said the rising number of enquiries is "exciting", but added "it also means there's plenty to do!"

"With so many resource orders to prepare and send, we've needed to recruit extra volunteers – and we are so grateful for their generous support."

The increasing number of individual enquiries suggests "growing awareness of the Catholic Enquiry Centre and increasing openness to the faith".

"Many practising Catholics also contact us seeking resources and support to help families, friends and others explore the Catholic faith."



Enquiry Statistics

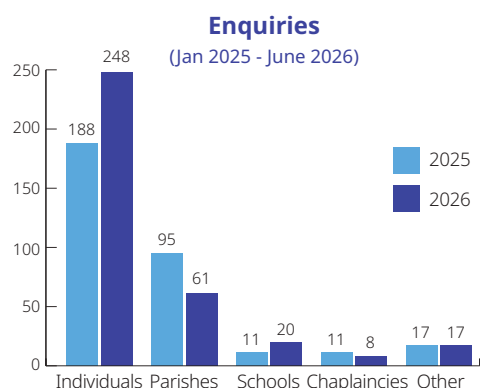
Individual enquiries are growing rapidly, with more people personally exploring faith, returning to the Church and seeking support.

The steel strengthening work is now complete and most of the interior scaffolding has been removed, giving a much clearer view of the church interior. The block sacristy addition has been demolished, revealing the original exterior church stone that had been hidden for many years.

The next stages of the restoration include:

- Electrical rewiring;
- New lighting and heating;
- Interior painting;
- New carpets;
- Restoration of the altar area and statues.

As soon as engineers give the sign-off, an open day will be held to give supporters and members of the community an opportunity to come inside and see the restoration work for themselves.

Night of thanksgiving, faith and community for Launch Out graduate

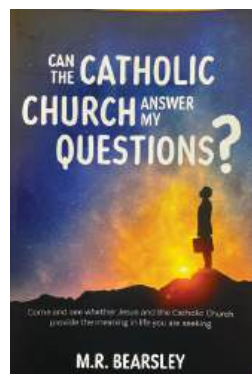
